THEME: RESPONSIVE CAREGIVING FOR CHILDREN IN DIVERSE CIRCUMSTANCES: INNOVATIONS AND INCLUSIVITY

Background

The early years (0-8 years) form the foundation of human development, serving as the most critical period for survival, growth, lifelong learning and development. The period is marked with rapid brain development characterized by massive neural connectivity needed for cognitive, social, motor and emotional development. Evidence suggests that an estimated 250 million children under the age of five in low- and middle-income countries are at higher risk of not reaching their full developmental potential because conditions threaten their nurturing care (Lancet, 2016). In Kenya, exposure to child poverty and inadequate care characterized by malnutrition, toxic stress and lack of stimulation increases risks of the children not reaching their development potential. Kenya's constitution, under Article 53, guarantees the right of the child to free and compulsory basic education, nutrition, shelter, health care and protection. In order to realize this constitutional provision, the National Government in collaboration with the County Governments and other stakeholders have made great strides in the development of policy frameworks targeting Maternal, Child and Adolescent Health, Early Learning and Stimulation, Food Security and Child Protection. However, gaps in the coordination, ECD Workforce development and adequate financing continue to affect access to quality, affordable, equitable and relevant ECD services to children and their families across the country.

About The Early Childhood Development Network for Kenya (ECD Network for Kenya)

ECD Network for Kenya exists to strengthen coordination and collaboration between the Government (at National and County Levels) and non-state actors and support development and implementation of relevant ECD policies and programmes in Kenya through capacity development, research and advocacy. The Network works closely with National and County governments, organizations, parents and community members to ensure that children are able to access and participate in high-quality, holistic Early Childhood Development (ECD) programs. Specifically, the Network seeks to:

- 1. Promote equitable access to quality ECD services in Kenya for all children
- 2. Develop and work for an enabling environment that encourages local research in ECD
- 3. Strengthen ECD stakeholders' collaboration and coordination
- 4. Influence financial resource allocation and utilization towards ECD programs in Kenya

Proposed Theme and Objectives of the 4th ECD Stakeholders' Conference

Theme: Responsive Caregiving for Children in Diverse Circumstances: Innovations and Inclusivity (Considerations: All children in emergencies and other circumstances; Covid-19 crisis/Response; early

learning, health system/workers; home; child-cares and related facilities such as prisons, refugee settings and places of worship).

The **objectives** of the conference include:

i. Create awareness on the need for integration of nurturing care practices in ECD service delivery;

ii. advocate for systemic change through policy, at National and County levels; iii. Push for increased sustainable nurturing care investments in Kenya

(Considerations: demand for government to be intentional about budget allocations; for example, NHIF; young women accessing credit for their children; Linda mama;

Women's economic empowerment)

iv. Interrogate the social fabric and its impact on holistic child development (Considerations: positive cultural values; intergenerational discourse on passing down morality; case studies; caregiver experiences, COVID 19 response)

- Childcare in Humanitarian situations
- Policies, Guidelines, Regulations and financing in Childcare settings
- Childcare in urban informal Settings
- Childcare in diverse religious and cultural settings
- Childcare at the workplace/marketplace
- Childcare for the vulnerable groups (e.g. disability, orphans, institutionalized, children in incarceration, street children)
- Childcare and Women's Economic Empowerment
- Rethinking childcare workforce
- Male involvement in childcare work
- Protection and Safety in Childcare
- SDGS and Emerging Issues in Childcare settings
- Teen motherhood and the plight of children of teen mothers
- COVID-19 and Childcare
- The Nurturing Care Framework

Conference Expected Outcome

By the end of the conference it is expected that participants will commit to raising the profile of the ECD agenda in Kenya through strategic financial investment, multi-sectoral collaboration and engagement in related public policy processes both at the National and County level. Similar to the second conference, participants will lobby the political leadership to prioritize ECD as a critical sector and showcase best practices from counties currently scaling up ECD initiatives. A conference report and communique will be developed post conference and media communication activities. Documented conference proceedings will therefore be shared through a written report and documentary.
